I now wish to profile the Hamilton Angling & Hunting Association which is located at Ancaster, not too far from Hamilton. The mailing address is PO Box 81161 Fiddler's Green, Post Office, Ancaster, Ontario L9G 4X2. If you are setting your GPS coordinates, the actual location is 1317 Albertson Rd. S. Ancaster. The club is generally open Sundays 10 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and Wednesday evenings 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. The contact person(s) are Ray Norton (905-765-2008) and alt. J.R. Neil (905-648-4376). There are 5 trap fields with automatic traps. Singles, handicap and doubles are thrown as well as rifle and handgun (members only), skeet and archery (handicap accessible).

I have shot at this club several times and find it to be well maintained and well run with a nice background. The thing that intrigued me the most about the members is that they are innovative. This is the only club I have seen anywhere where the trap house is designed to slide on rollers so that several people can then load targets from all sides of the machine. When loaded, the trap house is slid back into place and locked. At least three of their fields are designed this way very efficient.
