### **President's Corner**

#### **Results of the Membership Survey**

The survey results are now in and the Board is pleased to share them and our preliminary actions with the membership. It will take some time to fully analyze and determine how we effectively deal with all of the input received. We will keep the membership posted as decisions are made.

We received a total of 83 surveys out of 415 mailings. That is a response rate of about 20% which is much better than most surveys!

Many respondents did not provide a response for every question; hence, the total number of responses per question varies. This does not diminish the value of the input. Not answering a question simply mean it is in the middle range.

A copy of the survey along with the weighted average of the responses is attached as an appendix along with the comments that were offered. A high weighted average indicates a high level of agreement and a low number indicates a high level of disagreement. The weighted averages are color coded to give a visual sense for the level of support. The heat map is color coded for the weighted averages as follows:

- 0) between 3.5 and 5.0 is green indicating *strong agreement*;
- 1) between 2.5 and 3.5 is yellow indicating *agreement*; and,
- 2) between 1 and 2.5 is red indicating *strong disagreement*.

As can be seen, there are many issues where there is strong support and the comments tend to reinforce the numerical results. There are also contentious issues. The comments provide ideas that will be useful in making strategic and other decisions about the direction of the OPTA over the next few years. It will be informative to do another survey in a few years to get a sense for how well the Board has performed as well as identify further changes that will improve the sport.

The balance of this article will focus on the Board's interpretation of the results and provide a sense for how each will be addressed going forward.

Question 1 sought information about the membership's support for raising revenue. The support for increasing revenue was high and it is clear there are preferred approaches to raising money. The Board is sensitive to the budgetary constraints of people on fixed income and took this into account in making decisions. Based on the feedback the Board decided to:

1. Focus on increasing revenue from advertising and sponsorship. The Board will seek advertisers for the program and already has positive commitment from several sources. It is planned to charge \$300 for the inside front page and outside back page; \$200 for the inside back page; \$125 for a full interior page; and, \$75 for half of an interior page. Several companies and individuals have offered to take an advertisement.
2. Advertising in the Newsletter will cost \$125 for a full page and \$75 for a half page.
3. A sponsorship program will be set up and sponsors with recognition in the program. A donation of \$99 or less will be a Bronze Sponsor; a donation between \$100 and \$199 a Silver Sponsor; \$200 to \$499 a Gold Sponsor; and, \$500 or over will be a Platinum Sponsor. Several sponsors have already provided funds.
4. Membership fees will increase to \$20 effective in the 2013 target year. The increase is less than the cost of 2 boxes of shells and should be palatable to most members.
5. After much discussion, it was decided to increase target costs by 1/2 cent per target. This amounts to an additional 50 cents per hundred targets or \$1.50 for all three events.

Question 2 sought information about the program. The membership was satisfied with the size and content and recommended more advertising. The Board will increase the number of pages and seek advertisers as outlined in the discussion of Question #1.

Question 3 sought member input about the overall organization of the shoot. There were some strong positives and a number of significant negatives. Warren McLay and I will meet with the HGC executive to begin discussion about what we can do to improve the facilities. The following summarizes the discussion points:

1. We need to improve the washroom facilities, in particular, the portable toilets. The current supplier does not work on Sunday and Monday of the long weekend so the last clean up was Saturday. We will suggest changing the suppliers and adding more toilets.
2. The speaker system needs to be upgraded on the west side and speakers placed in strategic positions on the east side.
3. Though timing was significantly improved last year, there is still a desire to start earlier so the shoot-offs can be conducted in natural light. The Board discussed this in detail but believed the real issue is getting the early squads up and shooting on time. We will be offering a \$2.00 discount to each shooter in the 1st squads to sign up. However, the squad must start shooting within 5 minutes of the start time or the next squad will start. If the whole squad does not start on time, it will have to re-squad and forfeit the discount. If a single shooter fails to start shooting in the given time frame, but the rest of the squad does, the individual will have to take a make-up. This approach may provide some offset to the increase in target fees.

4. More picnic tables and rest benches will be provided along with tents to increase the shaded areas.
5. Golf-carts will be available for a fee starting on the day of the shell shoot.

Question 4 sought input regarding trophies. Responders offered a number of recommendations which the Board has discussed. The following changes will be made for the 2012 Ontario Championships:

1. The money allocated to trophies has been doubled.
2. The returning doubles shooter trophy has been dropped.
3. The two man team will be based on ATA average with the combined average of the two shooters to be 190 or lower.
4. Bonus Bucks are being dropped with the money transferred to trophies and to double the handicap purse. The idea behind Bonus Bucks was to provide a reasonable cash award rather than a large number of insignificant awards. The Board believes this objective can be better accomplished by re-allocating the cash to the handicap event as all competitors compete on a more equitable footing.
5. The club team championship award has been dropped due to lack of participation.

This question also sought input about the number of targets required to qualify for the All Star teams. The current requirements were considered acceptable though the northern and eastern clubs raised valid points about travel distances to get in enough targets. While sympathetic to the issue, the Board decided to retain the current requirements as suggested by the survey.

Question 5 asked about the Newsletter. This is a popular item and the Board is committed to providing it on a quarterly basis. Members who are interested in receiving a personal copy should forward their e-mail address to [ppmuma@rogers.com](mailto:ppmuma@rogers.com) and they will be added to the OPTA's e-mail list. Additionally, the Newsletter will be posted on the website and a few copies will be mailed/e-mailed to clubs who can make it available to members who do not have access to a computer.

Question 6 focused on the number of OPTA sponsored shoots and other issues such as Home Club grounds etc. There were some interesting responses to the questions in this section! The input to the questions under #6 strongly support the desire for members to have a home club, whether it be owned by the OPTA or through affiliation with another club. The following summarizes the decisions that were made and identifies recommendations that will require more planning;

1. It was decided the OPTA would sponsor trophies for two shoots at smaller clubs over the summer. Since the attendance will not be as big as it would be at a larger club, it was decided to half the sponsorship amount. If this proves successful, the decision will be revisited next year.
2. Though most members seemed to support having an arrangement with an existing club to be the host club for the OPTA, our sense is that the preference is to have our own grounds. Recognizing the financial and political difficulties of establishing a new facility, most members voted for the alternative. The Board very quickly recognized the issues associated with establishing a home grounds but did not reach a resolution. This issue will require further consideration but currently it seems like a very stretch goal.
3. As an alternative, many members supported making an arrangement with an existing club to be the host club. The preference among the membership is the Hamilton Gun Club with some caveats. While making an arrangement with an existing club is a more feasible alternative than establishing a proprietary home grounds, the Board identified a number of issues that need to be resolved. Over the next few months the Board will discuss the recommendation further and investigate the potential arrangements that could be made.
4. Though HGC is the most popular candidate for the host club, a number of issues were raised in the survey with the administration at the club. While there is substance to the issues, the club has made a lot of progress in improving administration. The 2011 Championships were the most efficient in recent memory though there was significant support from the OPTA Board. Over the next few months, we will have discussions with HGC about the possibility of the club being the OPTA home grounds. However, the relationship must be symbiotic with clear benefits, financial and otherwise, to both partners. As these discussions progress, we will report back to the membership.

In conclusion, the Board thanks the membership for its enthusiastic response to the survey. There was excellent input that will provide guidance in improving trapshooting in Ontario for at least the next two years. More importantly, the results gave a strong sense that trapshooting has a strong core of ardent supporters which is very encouraging for a volunteer Board.

We look forward to seeing you all at shoots over the summer and hope you all have your best personal year ever!

Who would be responsible for the maintenance and upkeep this would be a huge expense for the OPTA considering we currently host one major tournament per year and annually lower attendance pates. HGC has the best background throws more consistent targets and has the best suited facility to host the prov. Champs. Records will prove that higher scores are produced at this club on a regular basis shooters proved this to be the club of choice with an overwhelming majority vote to allow the OPTA Board to negotiate a load to the HGC to rebuild it's facility to ensure that the Prov. Champs would continue to be held at this club exclusively. Although there may be other clubs that would do a fine job of running this tournament let us not forget that the OPTA's first responsibility is to the membership and not the clubs.</p> <p>➤ I would also remind the Board that although not in writing there has been a gentleman's agreement that if the HGC mortgaged their property to the OPTA for the funds required to rebuild the facility for the purpose of accommodating the Prov. Champs that the OPTA in good sportsmanship would allow the HGC to continue hosting this tournament until this loan was repaid. Has this Board become less than good sportsmen? ➤ OPTA Board needs to do the best for the shooters as it sees fit

➤ The downfall of Ontario shooting has had a lot to do with the OPTA Champs and Hamilton Gun Club. Ideally the purchase of property would provide a fresh start but may be unattainable. ## **Message from Your ATA Delegate**

Greetings shooters. As many of you know, the delegate reports that I write for Trap and Field Magazine are often done 60 or more days in advance of the publication date. After the publication of my article I then share it. This gives Trap and Field Magazine some publishing priority.

What I am about to share with you in this article is a reversal of the above. In other words, you will have an opportunity to read this info before my Trap and Field article which will have similar content but will not be published until June or later. Since the shooting season is starting in earnest and you will be transporting firearms in your vehicles this may be a “must read”.

I am often retained to defend firearm owners on a variety of firearm-related charges. Make no mistake about it, whether the charges are laid under the Criminal Code or the Firearms Act (as a breach of its regulations for instance) they are all “criminal charges”. A conviction can have very serious consequences with the potential even on a first offence for such things as “careless storage” of a firearm of a criminal record, a firearms prohibition for five to ten years (usually), denial of a passport or ban on entry to other countries (e.g. United States of America), a fine, possible jail time, probation and the list goes on. Some in law enforcement have been known to candy-coat or trivialize the consequences. More and more individuals charged with offences are copping plea-bargains in situations where they could probably have won their case if it went to trial. But lawyers are expensive and results unpredictable so the path of least resistance is tempting for many people.

As a lawyer I do my utmost best to know the law in areas in which I practice and give the best advice I can. I am a huge advocate of “preventative” law – in other words, in helping firearm owners understand the law and avoid getting into trouble in the first place.

When the Firearms Act was proclaimed in force, a series of Regulations were incrementally enacted that set out a “prescribed” set of measures that dictated what firearm owners were required to do in given situations

The “Storage, Display, Transportation and Handing of Firearms by Individuals Regulations” is one of the many regulations with the force of “criminal law” sanctions that dictates minimum standards in given circumstances.

In this article I will be referring only to those aspects of that regulation that relate to “non-restricted” firearms (such as most rifles and shotguns). And I will further restrict this article to

(1)Transportation of Non- Restricted Firearms

and (2)Storage of Non-Restricted Firearms

Prior to his untimely death in 2006, David Tomlinson of the National Firearms Association and myself regularly chatted about firearm legislation, the regulations, and the emerging and settled caselaw. We shared notes and caselaw.

Since David’s death there appears to be a huge information “void”. David did a great job in collecting and disseminating caselaw and defence arguments and strategies to assist defence lawyers and firearm owners. He was not a lawyer but knew more about the firearm laws than most lawyers that practice in the field of firearm defence work. David and I did not always agree on interpretation and strategy but we certainly did agree on one thing and that is that when a non-restricted firearm entered a vehicle, the Transportation of Non-Restricted Firearms Regulation applied until the firearm left the vehicle, irrespective of the length of time it was present in the vehicle.

There is an alarming increase in the number of charges being laid against individuals because the police are being instructed to investigate how long a firearm was present in a vehicle and under what circumstances and if they believe the firearm is being “stored” in the vehicle as opposed to being “transported” charges are being laid if they deem it appropriate.

In other words, law enforcement is taking the position that the firearm owner can't rely on the "transportation" regulation and that the "storage" regulation applies or S.86(1) of the Criminal Code of Canada applies (careless storage). A conviction for either has the same consequences.

When the transportation regulation ends and the "storage" regulation or S.86(1) kicks in is anybody's guess. I have seen cases recently where a firearm left in a vehicle overnight and in complete compliance with the transportation regulation has attracted charges under the storage regulation for unsafe storage. I have had two clients charged with careless storage inside the last six months in the same judicial district who reported the theft of a single firearm from their locked vehicle. The "transportation" regulation was complied with in each case and the firearm had been left in the vehicle for a short time period only (one case overnight and the other case – while the person worked at his day job.). With myself as defence counsel the Crown Attorney(s) can expect a fight. I believe I am right on the law but there is no telling what a judge will do. As one can appreciate it is very difficult for any lawyer to give good advice to individuals as to which regulation applies and when it ends and other takes over.

Nor may you construe this letter as me providing any "legal advice". I am alerting readers to a problem, the solution to which is currently unknown.

In a recent discussion with the legal advisor to the Chief Firearms Officer for the province of Ontario, she is pretty steadfast in her position that the "transportation" regulation may not apply to firearms in an "unattended vehicle" – it depends on the circumstances and police are being instructed to investigate the circumstances (and lay charges in situations where the police officer believes it appropriate)

Each fact situation may be different. Consider the following for instance

- a competitive shooter, or a hunter is away from home and has a hotel room. Is the firearm more secure in a locked vehicle, unloaded and not visible from the outside (i.e. in basic compliance with the transportation regulation) or in the hotel room where chamber maids etc. have regular access?
- A person who shares accommodation in an apartment (for instance) where others living there, or invited there, or even the landlord or service providers have access as opposed to it being unloaded and locked in a car trunk?
- A farmer leaves his firearm in his vehicle 24/7 for predator control in total compliance with the transportation regulations rather than "temporarily" storing it for predator control under the "storage" regulations where under the later it need not be rendered inoperable (e.g. trigger lock) nor stored in a container or receptacle kept securely locked (etc.)?

Perhaps the answer is to construct a "storage" facility in an automobile that meets the strictest requirements of both the "transportation" and "storage" regulations? Whatever you chose to do and how you chose to do it, just remember that some day you may be required to defend your choice(s) in front of a Judge.

Note: Part of the confusion and uncertainty may emanate from the "restricted" firearm (e.g. handguns) rules where these firearms must be stored at the person's residence and transported between the residence and an approved range and back again usually by the most direct route. There is no such requirement for non-restricted firearms.

I have taken the liberty of transcribing verbatim the two portions of the Storage, Display, Transportation and Handling of Firearms by Individuals Regulations as they relate to "storage of non-restricted firearms" and "transportation of non-restricted firearms". The full regulation can be found at →

*Storage, Display, Transportation and Handling of Firearms by Individuals Regulations, SOR/98-209, (Firearms Act)*

STORAGE OF NON-RESTRICTED FIREARMS

5. (1) An individual may store a non-restricted firearm only if
- (a) it is unloaded;

(b) it is

(i) rendered inoperable by means of a secure locking device,

(ii) rendered inoperable by the removal of the bolt or bolt-carrier, or

(iii) stored in a container, receptacle or room that is kept securely locked and that is constructed so that it cannot readily be broken open or into; and

(c) it is not readily accessible to ammunition, unless the ammunition is stored, together with or separately from the firearm, in a container or receptacle that is kept securely locked and that is constructed so that it cannot readily be broken open or into.

(2) Paragraph (1)(b) does not apply to any individual who stores a non-restricted firearm temporarily if the individual reasonably requires it for the control of predators or other animals in a place where it may be discharged in accordance with all applicable Acts of Parliament and of the legislature of a province, regulations made under such Acts, and municipal by-laws.

(3) Paragraphs (1)(b) and (c) do not apply to an individual who stores a non-restricted firearm in a location that is in a remote wilderness area that is not subject to any visible or otherwise reasonably ascertainable use incompatible with hunting.

#### TRANSPORTATION OF NON-RESTRICTED FIREARMS

10. (1) An individual may transport a non-restricted firearm only if

(a) except in the case of a muzzle-loading firearm that is being transported between hunting sites, it is unloaded; and

(b) in the case of a muzzle-loading firearm that is being transported between hunting sites, its firing cap or flint is removed.

(2) Subject to subsection (3), an individual may transport a non-restricted firearm in an unattended vehicle only if

(a) when the vehicle is equipped with a trunk or similar compartment that can be securely locked, the non-restricted firearm is in that trunk or compartment and the trunk or compartment is securely locked; and

(b) when the vehicle is not equipped with a trunk or similar compartment that can be securely locked, the non-restricted firearm is not visible from outside the vehicle and the vehicle, or the part that contains the non-restricted firearm, is securely locked.

(3) If, in a remote wilderness area that is not subject to any visible or otherwise reasonably ascertainable use incompatible with hunting, an individual is transporting a non-restricted firearm in an unattended vehicle that is not equipped with a trunk or similar compartment that can be securely locked, and the vehicle or the part of it that contains the non-restricted firearm cannot be securely locked, the individual shall ensure that the non-restricted firearm

(a) is not visible; and

(b) is rendered inoperable by a secure locking device, unless the individual reasonably requires the non-restricted firearm for the control of predators.

A final note: Most people that get charged with careless (unsafe) storage offences voluntarily provide to the police all the circumstances the police need to convict you. It is not an offence to keep your mouth shut – do it.
