Greetings from Ontario, Canada

I write this article in late October, shortly after the Federal election that saw the Liberals capture a majority government. This was a surprise to many including myself. What this means is that all federal power within its allocated jurisdiction rests exclusively with the Prime Minister's office. There are no effective checks and balances such as in the U.S.A. which has Congress, Senate and the Executive Branch (vetoes and super vetoes). In Canada our Senate is supposed to be the Chamber of Sober Second Thought but it is a toothless tiger and able at best to delay legislation.

While the judicial system in both Canada and U.S.A. will deal with matters on primarily constitutional issues a lot of water flows under the bridge before cases are argued and decisions rendered.
